TONI EVE	Come in.
	mr and mrs COLE ENTER
TONI	Ah Mr and Mrs Cole. Come in, have a seat.
MR C	Thank-you. [They sit]
TONI	Thanks for coming in at such short notice.
	Now I expect you are wondering what this is all about.
MRS C	Well yes, we are Mrs Eve.
TONI	Please Mrs Cole, call me Toni.
MRS C	OK.
TONI	It's only the children I insist call me Mrs Eve. Pupil / teacher divide and all that.
MRS C	I see, yes.
TONI	Now, I expect you are wondering what this is all about.
MRS C	[confused at the repetition] We are yes.
MR C	Is Tom in some sort of trouble?
TONI	Yes, sort of.
MRS C	Has he done something wrong?
TONI	Not exactly, no.
MR C	His work's not up to scratch?
TONI	Oh, no his work is fine. Above average for a boarding pupil of nine actually. He is nine isn't he?
MRS C	Yes.
MR C	So what is the problem?
TONI	Well, the thing is Mr and Mrs Cole – and there's no easy way to put this – but on the surface of things it appears that we seem to have lost him.
MR C	What?

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TONI	Yes.
MRS C	Lost him? What do you mean lost him?
TONI	You know, lost him. We don't know where he is.
MRS C	I don't understand. How long has he been missing?
TONI	Good question Mrs Cole, very good question.
MR C	Well?
TONI	Since the last school trip.
MRS C	To Les Miserables?
TONI	Oh was that the last one? No, the one before that. The Science Museum.
MRS C	The Science Museum. That was two months ago.
TONI	Yes, about that.
MR C	He's been missing for two months and you're only just telling us.
TONI	Yes, sort of.
MR C	What do you mean sort of?
TONI	Well we did issue every child with a letter to post home to their parents to ask them to let us know if they happened to see Thomas. You obviously never got it.
MR C	Well maybe that was because our son who should have posted it has gone missing.
TONI	That could be a reason.
MRS C	Well have the police had any leads?
TONI	No, they haven't.
MR C	Have they done searches, put up posters?
TONI	No. Absolutely useless.
MRS C	How come?
TONI	How come? Exactly.
MR C	Well?
TONI	We haven't told them.

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MRS C	What!
TONI	The school budget is under considerable strain at the moment Mrs Cole and I'm afraid that phone calls have been one of the things we have had to cut back on
MR C	I'm sorry?
TONI	If Thomas had gone missing at the start of the financial year then naturally we would have called the police straight away.
MRS C	It's free to call 999 Mrs Eve.
TONI	Is it?
MRS C	Yes.
TONI	Oh, well I didn't know that. Now I know that, I will give them a ring. First thing Monday.
MR C	No, call them now!
TONI	Mr Cole, I hardly think it is polite of me to make a phone call in the middle of a meeting.
MRS C	What are you talking about? This is our son. Call the police.
TONI	Mrs Cole, if I interrupted meetings to call the police every time one of our pupils went missing then I can assure you I would spend most of my time on the phone and would get no other work done.
Mr C	What do you mean? How many other pupils have you lost?
TONI	I don't know. Off the top of my head four from year 5, eight from year 7, year 9
MRS C	Yes, how many from year 9?
TONI	No. All of year 9.
MR C	What? Look if you don't call them right now then I will.
TONI	There's no need to raise your voice Mr Cole. Let's not get this out of proportion.
Mr C	Out of proportion? You've lost our only son on a school trip and have failed to do anything about it for two months. How much more proportion do you want.
TONI	I'm sure he's fine.

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MR C	How can he be fine? He's nine years old and lost in a city of 7 million people.
TONI	He may have been taken in by a family of wolves.
MR C	What?
TONI	It's happened before. Kipling's Jungle Book springs to mind.
MR C	No Mrs Eve, the only thing springing to mind at the moment is Dostoevsky's The Idiot.
TONI	Well, clever you.
MRS C	Look Mrs Eve. Do you have any idea whatsoever what might have happened to Tom? Who was the last person to see him?
TONI	Right I wasn't going to tell you this
but as you have asked me out studicht. One of Themes' elegementes said he might	

but as you have asked me out straight. One of Thomas' classmates said he might – and I stress might – he might have seen Mrs Forbes giving Thomas to a museum official in exchange for a bundle of fifty pound notes.

MR C	And who the hell is Mrs Forbes?
TONI	Thomas' class tutor.
MR C	So what you are trying to tell me is that one of Thomas' classmates saw Mrs Forbes sell our son to the Science Museum?
TONI	No I said 'might' have seen. I did stress that Mr Cole.
Mrs C	And what does Mrs Forbes say?
TONI	She can't remember.
Mr C	Have you asked her?
TONI	No.
Mrs C	This is appalling.
TONI	Listen, I appreciate that all of this may be a bit of a shock and in certain ways you may feel we have let you down. By way of apology I would like to make you an offer. It is the least we can do. Just a sec. [SHOUTS OFF] Miss Townsend, can you come in now.
Miss T	[she enters] Hello Toni.
TONI	Hello Sarah. This is the couple.

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Miss T	Hi there, Sarah Townsend.
Mr C	So what? What's the offer?
TONI	She is.
Mrs C	What?
TONI	Yes, I would like to offer you Miss Townsend as a replacement for your son who we may, and I stress may, have sold to the Science Museum for £3000. Miss Townsend will simply imitate Thomas' mannerisms and behaviour and pick up where he left off. She will attend school here and live with you in the holidays, just as Thomas would have done. I think you will barely notice the difference.
Mrs C	She's nothing like Thomas.
TONI	No, not now, but pop a cap and a tie on her and give her a Spiderman lunchbox and I can assure you, the resemblance is spooky.
Mrs C	But she's a woman.
TONI	Yes.
Mrs C	She's got breasts.
TONI	Yes.
Mrs C	Not insignificant ones at that.
Miss Townsend	Yes.
Mrs C	It's the most ridiculous suggestion I ever heard in my life.
TONI	Mr Cole, any thoughts?
MR C	Well. Maybe it's worth a try.
